
TEACHER SPOTLIGHT: MR. HEATON, SPECIAL EDUCATION TEACHER & IEP COORDINATOR

Growing up, I attended my local community public high school in Barrington, Illinois before I transferred to a private boarding school outside of Boston. I lived at my boarding school, with my teachers living in rooms just down the hall from me and I graduated in 1987. For college, I started out at Hamilton College in upstate New York but felt a bit lost. I ended up landing a job working with cattle ranchers in New Mexico for 3 months, where I slept in a trailer without electricity or plumbing. Eventually, I landed at the University of Chicago closer to home. I received my bachelor's in Public Policy at U

to home. I received my bachelor's in Public Policy at U of C in 1992. I also have two graduate degrees. I earned an MFA in New Genres from the San Francisco Art Institute, but my art career did not take off. After I finished this program I moved to Japan to teach English in public middle schools. After, I received my second Master's in Education, which I received from Hunter College in 2007. Barton students may be surprised to know that I have been actively playing in a surf-rock band for the last 10 years. Surf rock is based on sounds created by the Beach Boys, Dick Dale, and the Ventures back in the 1960s. Surf rock is mostly instrumental (no vocals) and features soaring guitar solos. I play lead guitar so my job is to be good at the guitar solos. All in all, I am very happy that the long and winding road of my life has led to Barton.

I asked Samuel A. Ojo who he was as a person, to show that he is more than just that "guy with the highest average." His answer: "I'm from coming from a strict Nigerian household, my education has always been my priority. Every Nigerian/African knows the feeling of coming home with a high grade and their parents just look at it indifferently and tell you to do better. That is how it usually is in my home. I am not praised for my academic success, nor am I given anything I ask for because of that. My parents make sure to acknowledge my efforts and tell me to improve as a way of saying , "Good job, now let me see you top that." In my leisure time, I love to dance, cook/bake, play sports and tutor... My future aspiration is to become a defense

attorney or actor. I am overall a fun, funny person that loves to interact with people."

I did a little poking around and got Humphrey Banful, Ojo's right hand man, to open up about his dearest friend: *Question:* If you were 25 years old and you reflect on high school and reflect on the friends you made in the process, how would you describe your relationship with Samuel? *Humphrey's answer*: We're brothers. M.O.B. We out here. But Sam is a helper. He always wants to make sure his friends are on the right path.

I asked Ojo how it feels to be the Valedictorian of an entire school and his response was: "It feels great to be the school's valedictorian... On graduation day in Middle School, I promised myself that I would be the valedictorian of my high school class and here I am today. That promise was my **motivation**; it was what pushed me forward when I faced personal issues, family loss and self- doubt.... I would not be here if it weren't for the help of my friends, therapy, Gateway, and my amazing teachers. Although I worked hard, there have been times that I have made mistakes and mentally gave up, but always proved to be the blessed God that he is and favored me so that my average just kept on increasing. I thank God." Hopefully, students after him realize the truth behind these words.

I met Samuel my sophomore year. He is a very charismatic person who cares and does everything he does because he loves it. After school every Monday, Ojo would assist Mr. Mirer in arranging his folders, Mr. Mirer named a system of alphabetically arranging folders "Ojo". He would say "So who wants to 'Ojo' the folders today." You see, it is the people like Samuel that make High School feel like a community, not just a place to come and get a diploma. My advice to other students reading this is to find a Sam before it is too late.
